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ANNUAL REPORT - 1968

In the year 1968, Thoroughbred racing produced a record \$80,799,092 in revenue to the State as a result of a 4.9 per cent increase in wagering. This increase occurred despite the fact that the Legislature had raised the total "take-out" from 15 per cent to 16 per cent.

While the increased "take-out" did not apparently affect the total handle and revenue, there is no doubt that it did have an adverse effect on our main tracks' attendance, the daily average falling off by approximately one per cent. Another contributing factor was the large number of races (317) with small fields (six or less wagering units) that were run in 1968; small racing fields adversely affect both the attendance and the handle.

This Commission is of the opinion that additional stall space and training facilities are needed to accommodate the many horsemen who are unable to race in New York because space is not available. The construction of new facilities to accommodate more racing stock, thus assuring increased racing fields, will not only reverse the attendance drop, but will result in increased handle and greater revenue to the State.

In 1968, after five years of darkness, "Beautiful Belmont" once again opened its gates to the racing public. Most observers will agree that there is no track in America quite like Belmont. It is gratifying to record that The New York Racing Association was able to preserve the warmth and the charm of the old Belmont Park, even with the new construction and the many modern conveniences and innovations.

REVENUE TO THE STATE

The sport of Thoroughbred racing produced a record high of \$80,799,092 in revenue to the State in 1968, resulting chiefly from the largest volume of pari-mutuel wagering ever experienced in the State of New York.

Contributing, also, were the increases approximating 55 per cent in our track supervisory fees and an 18 per cent increase in our laboratory testing fees to compensate for increased operating costs over the past years.

For the record, the State relinquished, as mandated, the sum of \$300,444 representing a one-half of one per cent of its normal share of commission on the wagering for the first 18 racing days of the 1968 season to allow the Aqueduct track to subsidize its increased purse awards. The State's normal share was resumed on April 1, 1968 when the pari-mutuel tax was increased from 15 to 16 per cent with the addition going to our racing associations.

ATTENDANCE - GATE RECEIPTS AND ADMISSION TAXES

Attendance for the 360 days of racing in 1968 exceeded the 1967 attendance in its 355 days of racing by approximately one per cent. On a daily average, however, The N.Y.R.A. tracks' attendance was a trifle lower than for 1967, attributed by some to the increase in commissions from 15% to 16% which went into effect on April 1, 1968.

The year 1968 saw the restoration of racing at Belmont Park, providing patrons with a choice of two metropolitan race tracks. Although the Big "A", aided by its most convenient subway transportation system, outdrew the new Belmont Park, it is interesting to note that the daily average attendance at Belmont Park in 1968 exceeded its 1962 average (last year raced at old Belmont) by over 12 per cent, with an average daily wagering increase of over 20 per cent.

With the restoration, Belmont is again the Mecca of Thoroughbred racing in America.

TRACK FINANCIAL REPORTS

Following is a condensation of The New York Racing Association Inc.'s statement of income for the fiscal year ended February 29, 1968. The net result was a loss of \$1,289,472 before a credit for a tax refund arising from the loss carryback.

It is significant that in incurring this loss, the operators of the Aqueduct, Belmont Park and Saratoga tracks produced revenues to the State of close to 75 million dollars.

The loss to N.Y.R.A. was due to the need for supplementing their purse distributions by approximately \$3,200,000, which action ended the horsemen's five day boycott shortly after the opening of the 1967 race meetings.

A small consolation to N.Y.R.A. is that it cost the Federal Government approximately fifty per cent of the added \$3,200,000 in the resulting lessened federal income taxes.

FINGER LAKES TRACK

The financial statements of the Canandaigua Enterprises Corporation and its subsidiary company, the Finger Lakes Racing Association, Inc., report a gain of \$190,733 for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1968, an improvement over the preceeding year.

Although the Finger Lakes Racing Association is still in process of reorganization under the court appointed trustee, the Honorable Francis J. D'Amanda, the outlook appears more encouraging with steadily increasing patronage and wagering aided by an increased share of the pari-mutuel wagering effective in 1968.

PARI-MUTUEL STATISTICS - 1968-1967

The sum of \$723,629,731 was wagered in 1968, a record high despite a small drop in attendance as compared to the high of 1966.

The average bet per person per day for the Aqueduct, Belmont Park and Saratoga tracks in 1968 was \$104.27 surpassing the previous record high of \$100.15 in 1967. The up-state Finger Lakes track did well also in 1968 with a record high in wagering of \$35,297,067.

PURSE DISTRIBUTIONS

Our Thoroughbred tracks were granted much needed relief in their financing of purses to horsemen. Legislation, effective April 1, 1968, allowed the tracks an added one per cent in commissions with the proviso that one-half of the increase shall be used exclusively for the purpose of increasing purses.

A formula was devised by using the 1966 percentage of purses paid out by the racing associations to their respective 1966 wagering pools, plus the added one-half of one per cent, marking for the first time such regulation by the State.

The result was a record high payout in 1968 of purse distributions.

^{*} The New York Racing Association Inc. is required by an 1968 enactment to pay a minimum of 2.768 per cent of their total pools in purse distributions. As will be noted above, they paid out 2.776 per cent, excluding horsemen's contributions. The Finger Lakes track is required to pay out a minimum of 4.958 per cent. They paid out 4.920 per cent, excluding horsemen's contributions, breeder's awards and trophies.

THE PRESS

The newspapers, television and radio directed their respective talents with customery enthusiasm throughout 1968 to the presentation of New York's Racing Story. This combined media reached millions of devotees of the Thoroughbred sport throughout the land.

Television's "Race of the Week" plus Radio's interviews and other audio features were well received.

To those who were a part of this vast and comprehensive communications media the Commission extends its appreciation.

NEW YORK BREEDING

In 1968 there were 171 individual New York-bred starters at New York's race tracks, a most significant commentary on the progress of Thoroughbred breeding in the Empire State since the Commission set up its Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau in 1962.

Incidentally, of the 171 individual starters 70 won 122 races at Aqueduct, Belmont Park, Saratoga and Finger Lakes. Included were the stakes winners LUNARULLAH, by HAPPY NASRULLAH, winner of New York Breeders Juvenile Fillies Stakes, and FLOWER BILL, by DOCTOR BILL, winner of the New York Breeders Futurity in new stakes-record time. Both of these races were at Finger Lakes. At Belmont Park, on September 28, the New

York-bred MR. RIGHT scored a sensational victory over DAMASCUS in The Woodward Stakes. Early in the year, in California, MR. RIGHT became the first New York-bred winner of the famous Santa Anita Handicap. In the country at large, New York-breds won close to 300 races in 1968.

As an indication of progress, the nominations to the New York Breeders Futurity each year are enlightening. For the first running in 1963 there were 18 nominations: for the 1969 renewal there are 147 nominations.

In 1969 87 stallions will stand in New York State, 60 more than stood in 1962. But the important thing is that the new stallions added to the State's roster are, for the most part, exceptionally well-bred. They will size good horses, as have the well-bred New York stallions whose first few crops have made their appearances on the race track in the last year or two. And fine new mares are being acquired by New York's breeders.

To compete in such races as the New York Breeders Futurity or the Juvenile Fillies Stakes, or to make his breeder eligible for the breeders' awards granted by the New York Racing Association and the Finger Lakes Racing Association, a horse must have been registered with the New York State-Bred Registry. This Registry is headed by the presidents of the State's two breeders associations and the Director of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau. At the end of 1968, 932 foals had been registered with the State-Bred Registry: 869 of these had been registered since 1962.

Both of New York's breeders associations have been active throughout the year. The Genesee Valley Breeders Association held its 53rd Annual Autumn Show early in September on the grounds of the Lookover Stallion Station, which the association took over two years ago. Since its assumption of the Avon station significant progress has been made in the number of mares serviced each year.

In October the Genesee Valley Breeders Association re-elected its officers for another year. Dr. Joseph C. O'Dea is President, Charles W. Carson Vice President and Rear Admiral Hubert W. Chanler Secretary-Treasurer. The Directors consist of the officers and Michael Bokman, Fred L. King, Michael Magde, Dr. Stephen J. Roberts, Mrs. Patrick Lowther, Dr. David M. Davis, Daniel H. Conway, William Maxion, John Moffat and former President, Mark Welch, ex officio.

Also in October the Eastern New York Thoroughbred Breeders Association held its annual meeting and started its sixth year as an association. Thomas M. Waller was re-elected President, Dr. D. J. De Luke was elected Vice President, William B. Heller Secretary and Everett F. Schoenborn Treasurer. Directors elected were Oliver D. Appleton, John William Jacobs and James J. McCarthy. These gentlemen and the officers will join Henry T. Gibson, Edward E. Benedict, Seymour Cohn, Mrs. Thomas M. Waller, Emil Dolce and Hollie Hughes on the directorate of the E.N.Y.T.B.A.

In his address to their meeting, Joseph A. Gimma, Chairman of the State Racing Commission, noted that the Eastern New York Thoroughbred Breeders Association had been a leader in the field of communication, starting with the regular bulletin issued during the term of its first President, Edward E. Benedict, and culminating in the attractive magazine, the New York Thoroughbred Breeder, published with the cooperation of the Genesee Valley Breeders Association.

In September Belmont Park's beautiful walking ring was the scene of the first Yearling Show to be held at the famous park under the auspices of New York's eastern breeders' association. Hall of Fame trainer, John Gaver, was the judge and he commented on the unusually good-looking yearlings from all parts of the State.

In 1968, Alex M. Robb, Director of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau, and his Assistant, William H. Welch, visited the growing list of farms, all over the State, on which Thoroughbreds are stabled. As in previous years, hundreds of requests for information were directed to the office of the Bureau. Mares were evaluated for prospective buyers, breeding schedules furnished and the Stallion Register prepared and sent to interested breeders in New York and nearby States. Again the Bureau served as clearing house for the State-Bred Registry.

Again, during the year, the Director of the Bureau wrote his weekly column, "New York Breeding," for The Morning Telegraph. The image of
New York as an ideal place in which to breed Thoroughbreds has been
widely projected.

New York continued its steady progress in Thoroughbred breeding in 1968. Not only is numerical progress being registered; better horses are being bred each year and better stallions and mares are coming into the State.

BELMONT PARK REOPENS

Thoroughbred racing in the State of New York staged one of its truly great turf extravaganzas on Monday, May 20, to commemorate, after a five-year absence, the return of a prodigal member of its racing family. The gates of an almost completely reconstructed Belmont Park swung open to some 42,000 fans who did not conceal their admiration of its magnitude and beauty.

At a cost of approximately \$31,000,000, the traditions of yesteryear seemed to blend perfectly with modern-day architectural splendor..

Belmont Park today can accommodate from 85,000 to 90,000 spectators. A total of 23,615 seats, some 16,000 of which are located in the grandstand and club house areas, are under cover.

Nineteen elevators and five escalators placed in strategic areas served the public well on opening day. Belmont's vast horticultural displays, its pastoral paddock and ancient trees were never more beautiful.

The opening day fans saw Mrs. Frances Genter's IN REALITY triumph in the \$50,000-added Carter Handicap, the new track's inaugural feature.

It was a magnificent day's racing, and this Commission is looking forward to a future of classic events to be contested at what now must be recognized as America's finest race course.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF RACING

The State Racing Commission, as in the past, again points with pride to the fact that the National Museum of Racing is permanently located at Saratoga Springs in the State of New York.

Each year thousands of visitors, not necessarily all of whom are racing fans, visit this national shrine.

The Honorable Joseph A. Gimma, Chairman of the New York State Racing Commission, is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Museum.

The Museum attracted national attention in 1968 when an exhibit of paintings, bronzes and drawings was held at Wildenstein's Galleries in New York City for the benefit of the Museum. This exhibition scored an artistic triumph of such magnitude that its attractions were featured in a number of monthly magazines and periodicals during the year.

A rather sad note was recorded in Museum proceedings during the year 1968. This occurred on Tuesday, August 11, when word was received that Mr. George D. Widener, resigned as President. Mr. Widener served as chief executive of the Museum since 1960. His resignation was accepted with the deepest regret.

HALL OF FAME

American Racing's Hall of Fame, located in the National Museum at Saratoga Springs, had its annual installation on August 5.

Placed in its hallowed corridors of honor were the names of jockey James Stout and steeplechase jockeys Rigan McKinney and George H. (Pete) Bostwick. In the trainers' division, a long-time veteran of the racing wars, Frank E. Childs, was honored. A great horse of yesteryear, OLD ROSEBUD, was also installed.

PROTECTIVE MEASURES

Security programs carried out by the highly efficient Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau, the Pinkerton's, Inc. and the E. J. Burke Agency of Buffalo received this Commission's commendation for a job well done.

Pinkerton's uniformed police, detectives and special agents of the T. R. P. B. worked around the clock to insure New York racing the most efficient police protection accorded any major spectator sport.

Special attention was given to the prevention of illegal medication of horses, bookmaking, falsifying applications for licenses and other attempts at malpractice.

A tactical patrol force ever alert for suspicious persons within the grounds of our race courses operated with high efficiency.

Horse identification, fingerprinting of track personnel and fire prevention programs added to the vigilance carried out by men highly trained for this type of work.

Their efficiency in individual and unit operation continues to inspire public confidence in the conduct of the sport in the State of New York.

THE WORK OF THE LABORATORY

Tests designed to prevent illegal drugging in race horses received unusual publicity in the United States during 1968 because of a disqualification of the winner of the Kentucky Derby, the urine of which was reported to contain a drug. It is felt that the danger of such a situation in New York has been minimized because the testing program in this State has been the most thorough of any racing jurisdiction for many years. In the light of the aforementioned event, routine testing was intensified to afford increased protection for the racing public.

The effectiveness of this policy is indicated by the fact that illegal drugging has consistently been very low in New York for many years. No positive findings on samples from Thoroughbred racing were reported during the 1968 season. The Commission hopes this record will continue.

A total of 35,722 official samples was analyzed. This included 12,131 from Thoroughbred racing (8,721 from Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga race tracks and 3,410 from the Finger Lakes track), 23,413 from eight New York Harness tracks, 77 from the New York State Sire Stakes at the Syracuse State Fairgrounds, and 98 from races supervised by the American Quarter-horse Association of New York.

Three cooperative official samples from two other jurisdictions were received and analyzed.

In addition to the heavy routine workload, 116 experimental and investigational samples were analyzed and 27 separate tests were made for sedatives at the request of the Stewards.

Applied research was continued and new equipment was installed to increase laboratory capacity and to improve the methods of analysis.

The laboratory file of photomicrographs was augmented by 43 negatives and 55 prints.

The chief chemist and the associate chemist attended the 22nd annual meeting of the Association of Official Racing Chemists in Miami Beach, Florida. Correspondence has been maintained with other racing chemists in many parts of the world. In addition, the laboratory was visited by chemists from Argentina, Colombia and Japan. Seventeen officials visited the laboratory in connection with their attendance at the Jockey Club School for racing officials.

ACTIVITIES OF THE TESTING ENCLOSURE

During the 234 days of racing at the Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga tracks, 4,366 saliva samples were collected by the Supervisor of Drug Tests. Of these, 2,114 were from winners, 2,096 from horses which finished second, 73 from thirds, 71 from fourths and 12 which were taken at the request of the Stewards.

Urine samples, totaling 4,354 in number, also were collected by our staff of Inspectors. Of these, 2,102 were from winners, 2,096 from second horses, 73 from thirds, 71 from fourths and 12 were taken at the request of the Stewards.

During the 126 days of racing at the Finger Lakes track, 2,267 saliva samples were collected. Of these, 1,133 were from winners, 1,127 from horses which finished second, three from thirds, and four which were taken at the request of the Stewards.

Urine samples totaling 1,143 were collected. Of these, 1,137 were from winners, two from second horses and four at the request of the Stewards.

THE SARATOGA SALES

The 48th Annual Yearling Sales were conducted for the first time in the new, two-tiered Humphrey S. Finney Pavilion, and the sales once again established new records. A new record gross was achieved when 263 head sold for \$6,423,800, an average price of \$24,425, also a new record.

Highlights of the auction, besides the above records, were the sales of the highest-priced filly and the highest-priced colt ever auctioned in a Saratoga Yearling Sale. The filly, by HAIL TO REASON out of COSMAH, which sold for \$225,000, was consigned by Gainesway Farm and purchased by Elliott Burch, as agent for Mr. Paul Mellon and Mr. Charles W. Engelhard. The colt, by *SEA-BIRD out of SOFARSOGOOD, sold for \$210,000 and was also consigned by Gainesway Farm. The purchaser was Mrs. Henry Ford II, bidding for the Watermill Stable which she owns with her brother, Mr. T. Murray McDonnell.

HORSES OF RACING AGE

The five sales of horses of racing age held in New York grossed \$2,030,750 for 397 head, an average of \$5,115.

The yearling sales and five horses of racing age sales conducted and 1968 grossed \$8,454,550 for 660 head. In 1967, the totals were \$7,498,850, for 668 head.

HORSES RACED (Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga)

In compiling facts and figures for its annual report, the Commission is careful to record the racing performance of each horse which competed. This compilation lists individually the name of the horse, its owner, trainer and also the jockey who had the mount in each contest. At the end of the season, these records furnish the purse award data for our annual report. These statistics reveal the following items of interest.

- (1) The number of individual horses raced during the season totaled 3,269, of which number 205 were horses entered in jumping races.
- (2) In the 234 days of racing, we had 2,106 races with a total of 19,760 starters.

WINNING FAVORITES

A total of 654 public choices won in 2,021 races on the flat at Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga, a percentage of 32. The highest percentage of winning favorites was attained at the Aqueduct Fall meet where 115 favorites won in 342 races, an average of 34 per cent.

There were 85 jumping races and in these events held at Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga race courses, 30 favorites won, an average of 35 per cent. The highest percentage mark of winning favorites was set at the Aqueduct Fall Meeting where five public choices won in ten races, an average of 50 per cent.

At the Finger Lakes track, a total of 395 favorites won in 1,134 races run, a percentage of 35. The highest mark was reached at the Autumn Meeting in which 135 favorites won in 351 races, an average of 38 per cent.

APPRENTICE JCCKEYS

Apprentice jockeys literally came into their own during the 1968 racing season in the State of New York. Upwards of thirty young men were licensed by the New York Commission during the past season, the major-ity of whom displayed above ordinary ability.

Perhaps the most sensational of the "Bug Riders" was Doug Thomas who accounted for 132 winners.

In closest pursuit of Thomas was Robert E. Wholey, Jr., son of the former jockey, who was to enter the winners circle 72 times.

Anthony Garramone accounted for 55 winners while jockey Anthony M. Loguercio tallied 29. Apprentice Joseph Urrutia was the saddle star of the Finger Lakes meeting with a total of 77 victories. This colorful young man shared the spotlight, at the popular western New York race course, with such outstanding apprentices as Charles R. Simpson with 36 winners, Steve Rowan 24, Michael G. Murphy 19, Paul Morales 14 and a host of others who bid fair to be high on the list of top riders next season.

The development of apprentice jockeys has long been a high priority project of the State Racing Commission. We are happy to say New York led the nation in 1968.

STEEPLECHASE RACING

Steeplechasing and hurdle racing in New York continued on the excellent high plane of recent years and appeared to have a sustaining level of public support. In addition to Mrs. T. A. Randolph's BON NOUVEL, the seasonal selection as Steeplechaser of the Year, several new brush horses of more than ordinary ability were seen at the New York tracks. These included Guilford Dudley, Jr.'s ROUBLET II, a Chilean bred, which won three stakes during the season. CHINA RUN was purchased by F. Eugene Dixon, Jr. a few days prior to The Temple Gwathmey Stakes. Under his new owner's silks, the four-year-old bested older horses to win the \$50,000 race under the testing three-mile and a furlong distance, and did so in record breaking time. It is interesting to note that CHINA RUN, while racing for Mrs. Marion du Pont Scott some weeks earlier, also set a new course record for the two and one-half mile distance.

The re-opening of Belmont Park was hailed by steeplechase interests who have long considered it to be the home of steeplechasing in America.

There were 85 races run through the field in which 672 horses competed for purse awards of \$814,850. The leading owner in the amount of

purses won was Mrs. Theodora A. Randolph with \$49,711, followed by Allison Stern with \$45,756 and Mrs. William C. Riker with \$41,495.

HORSE OF THE YEAR

In an unprecedented sweep of national racing polls, Tartan Stable's champion of champions DR. FAGER carried off the title "Horse of the Year" under double wraps in 1968.

The four-year-old Florida-bred colt, now retired to stud, was the unanimous choice in the annual write-in of experts from The Morning Telegraph and Daily Racing Form.

The amazing DR. FAGER, trained by Johnny Nerud, won seven of eight races in 1968, carrying 134 lbs. in the Washington Park Handicap. He established a world record for the mile in 1:32 1/5. In winning the time-honored Suburban Handicap at Aqueduct under 132 lbs., he equalled the track record for the mile and a quarter, negotiating the distance in 1:59 3/5. Perhaps his most notable feat was establishing a new track record for seven furlongs when he romped to victory in the Vosburgh Handicap, also run at Aqueduct, in which he carried 139 lbs.

Other than being proclaimed the undisputed "Horse of the Year", DR. FAGER also annexed the championship in three other divisions in 1968.

^{**}Steeplechase

The mighty son of ROUGH 'N TUMBLE and ASPIDISTRA, owned by William L. McKnight, was named by popular acclaim the Best Handicap Horse, Best Grass Horse and Best Sprinter. He left few other worlds to conquer.

DR. FAGER, ably handled in all but one of his 1968 starts by his regular jockey Braulio Baeza, accounted for four of his classic victories at race courses in New York State. The fans at Aqueduct and Saratoga undoubtedly saw one of America's truly turf greats. His valedictory was at Aqueduct in the Vosburgh Handicap on November 2nd.

Other divisional champions who were seen under colors in New York in 1968 were: TOP KNIGHT, Best 2-Year-Old Colt or Gelding, TOP KNIGHT, Best 2-Year-Old, GALLANT BLOOM, Best 2-Year-Old Filly, STAGE DOOR JOHNNY, Best 3-Year-Old Colt or Gelding, DARK MIRAGE, Best 3-Year-Old Filly, DARK MIRAGE, Best 3-Year-Old. William Haggin Perry's GAMELY, rated Best Handicap Filly or Mare, scored in a very close decision over Bohemia Stable's POLITELY. The title of Best Steeplechaser for 1968 fell to Mrs. T. A. Randolph's BON NOUVEL.

The outstanding performances of the above-named horses sustains the time-honored tradition that racing champions earn their titles only after they have competed with the nation's best on New York race tracks.

This Commission is proud that only the New York racing public was privileged to watch all of these champions in action, in keeping with our standard of presenting the highest quality of racing.

THE CLAIMING BOX

RULINGS OF THE STEWARDS Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga

Sixty-seven horses were disqualified by the Stewards during the 234 days of racing at the Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga tracks, six less than the previous year when we had four days less of Thoroughbred racing. For infractions of the rules during the actual running of the races, the Stewards suspended jockeys on 37 separate occasions, exactly the same number as last year. Jockeys set down on more than one occasion accounted for 17 of these suspensions.

Angel Cordero Jr. was suspended on three different occasions, for a total of 30 days. Jockeys Eddie Belmonte, (Apprentice) Antonio Garramone, (Apprentice) Jose Suarez, (Apprentice) Doug Thomas, Fernando Toro and Michael Venezia each had two suspensions for totals of 20 days. Steeplechase Jockey Leo O'Brien received two suspensions totaling 15 days, while Jockey Efrain Santana had one 15-day suspension.

Fines paid for various infractions of the rules by licensed personnel (including an owner, a trainer and an assistant trainer) amounted to \$660.

NECROLOGY

MARSHALL CASSIDY: One of the most distinguished personalities in American Thoroughbred racing died at the age of 76 in Glen Cove, Long Island, on Wednesday, October 23, the result of injuries suffered in an automobile accident in August of 1968.

Mr. Cassidy was a member of a prominent American racing family.

His father, Mars Cassidy, officiated as Starter at all New York race tracks

for over 35 years. George Cassidy, present Starter on the New York circuit,

is Marshall Cassidy's younger brother.

His life long association with the American turf, together with his many contributions to its betterment, prompted the racing fraternity to confer upon him the title "Mr. Racing."

He had at one time served as Steward representing the New York State Racing Commission during the tenure of its then Chairman, Herbert Bayard Swope. Mr. Cassidy also functioned as Executive Secretary of The Jockey Club from 1941 to 1965.

Marshall Cassidy made many monumental contributions to the sport which claimed his complete devotion, including the founding of The Jockey Club School for Racing Officials; inauguration of The Jockey Club Round Table, a national turf forum held at Saratoga each year; pioneering the development of the starting gate, film patrol, photo finish camera and horse identification system.

Mr. Cassidy was a great force for much of the progress identified with present day racing in New York State and the nation. This Commission records with deep regret his passing and extends to the surviving members of his family its sincere condolences.

EARL SANDE: Former jockev Earl Sande, immortalized by Damon Runyan in the poem "The Handy Guy," died in Selem, Oregon on August 20 at the age of 69.

The name Earl Sande skyrocketed across the American sports scene in the early 1920's. A three time winner of the Kentucky Derby and a member of racing's Hall of Fame at Caratoga, Sande, according to turf historians, was without question the greatest jockey of his time.

He shared newspaper headlines with such luminous names as Jack Dempsey, Bill Tilden, Bobby Jones and Johnny Weismuller, all contemporaries in what the late Grantland Rice referred to as "The Golden Age of Sports."

Earl Sande on three occasions headed the list as the nation's

leading money-winning rider. Other than his three Derby wins, Sande gained everlasting turf fame as the rider of ZEV and GALLANT FOX, the latter of which he guided to victory in the Triple Grown.

In the years 1922 and 1923, Sande hit the peak of his spectacular career. It was during these two years that "The Handy Guy," as contract rider for the famed Roncocas Stable, became the toast of the New York racing circuit.

The pinnacle of his meteoric career was undoubtedly reached at Belmont Park in the Fall of 1923. It was at this beautiful New York race course, resplendent in autumn colors, that Sande guided Harry F. Sinclair's mighty ZEV to a lopsided victory over the English Derby winner PAPYRUS, ridden by the leading British jockey of that era, Steve Donaghue.

A five-time winner of the classic Belmont Stakes, Sande rode some of the nation's best. He piloted the mighty Man o' War to victory in the Miller Stakes at Saratoga in 1920, and in later years was to proclaim the Glen Riddle champion the greatest horse he ever rode.

Racing fans throughout the world join the New York State Racing Commission in mourning the passing of Earl Sande, probably the most colorful jockey in American turf history.

BRYAN FIEID: Bryan Field, colorful turf writer and a pioneer broadcaster of horse races, died at Wilmington, Delaware on December 14. For many years a familiar figure around New York race courses, Mr. Field parlayed a cultivated Oxonian accent into a successful career as a TV, Radio and Public Address Announcer.

The 68-year-old turf personality began his career as a sports reporter for The New York Times and was rated a turf writer of rare perception.

At the time of his passing, Mr. Field held the position of Vice-President of Delaware Park Race Course.

This Commission is saddened by his death and takes this opportunity to extend condolences to the members of his family.

EDWARD L. KILROE: Edward L. Kilroe, who was associated with New York racing for some thirty years as an administrative official, died in New York on April 28 at the age of 60.

Mr. Kilroe, son of the late Dr. Edward P. Kilroe and brother of Frank E. (Jimmy) Kilroe, had a host of friends on the New York circuit.

A one time General Manager of old Aqueduct for the Queens County Jockey Club, Mr. Kilroe was Director of Admissions for The New York Racing Association at the time of his death.

The New York State Racing Commission extends its sincerest expressions of regret to the members of his family.

WILBERT F. (EERT) MULHOLLAND: One of Thoroughbred racing's more capable horse trainers, died at the age of 84 on July 11 at Germantown, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Mulholland had been associated with George D. Widener for some 45 years and since 1932 was Mr. Widener's head trainer.

In 1967, Bert Mulholland was voted into racing's Hall of Fame at Saratoga Springs, New York. A quiet, reserved man, Mr. Mulholland was nonetheless a shrewd and capable horseman who earned the respect of his colleagues in the training profession through the years.

Some of the good stakes horses trained by Mulholland were: EIGHT THIRTY, LUCKY DRAW, JAIPUR, PLATTER, BATTLEFIELD, JAMES TOWN and SATION.

In expressing sorrow for Mr. Mulholland's passing, the State Racing Commission pauses to pay tribute to the following New York trainers who will also be missed from their familiar places on the backstretch. They are: John H. (Jack) Skirvin, A.G. (Bob) Robertson, J.P. (Sammy) Smith and Dewey Bentham.

MRS. GEORGE D. WIDENFR: Mrs. George D. Widener, one of the truly great ladies of American racing, died at Miami Beach, Florida on March 10.

Mrs. Widener, wife of George D. Widener, Honorary Chairman of The Jockey Club, raced her own horses for many years on the New York tracks.

A gracious sportswoman, her silks of "red, dark blue hoops, dark blue cap" were carried by many top flight Thoroughbreds. In 1953, Mrs. Glener's champion filly, EVENING OUT, was voted the champion of her division.

The New York State Racing Commission will always remember Mrs. Fidener as a strong supporter of the sport in the Empire State.

To Mr. George D. Widener, the Commission extends its most sincere condolences.

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

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1968 Annual Repor

The New York State Harness Racing Commission licensed 19,743 individuals (a new record) for participation in the 1968 harness racing season. Revenue to the State soared to \$74,896,470.53, (a new record) with the pari-mutuel handle reaching an unparalleled \$735,899,109.

Attendance dipped slightly, 1.66% to 8,821,226. There are many factors involved which might have influenced the aforementioned statistics. Although the State received an additional ½ of 1% of the pari-mutuel takeout, there were 13 fewer racing days, plus an extended period of severe weather.

The New York Commission took steps in 1968 to eliminate a hazard that has been with harness racing since its inception. A survey established that 62% of the accidents on the race track resulted from a horse stepping through a wheel.

As of July 1, 1968 disc wheels were made mandatory. The New York Commission was the first to take this action which has since been followed by the USTA and many other state commissions. \$22,792,196 was paid in purses to horsemen, a new record. Two New York owned horses won the Triple Crown at each gait - Nevele Pride on the trot and Rum Customer on the pace. (see cover)

The Commission conducted a series of meetings on rules and regulations before promulgating the 1968 book, and seminars were held for officials, in New York City and in Syracuse.

Dr. E. Ogden Bush retired as a Commissioner on September 30, 1968. We shall miss his wise counsel and the enthusiastic cooperation he offered during his term as a Commissioner.

The Commission requires all participants in New York harness racing to file a detailed notarized application, together with a set of fingerprints, and photographs. Renewal applications must include updated information and each application is reviewed and carefully processed before a final decision is made. These security measures have provided the Commission with comprehensive fingerprint reports and background information on every applicant since 1954.

In 1968, the Commission maintained its policy of refusing to grant licenses to those applicants whose backgrounds it considered detrimental to the best interests of the sport. With the harness racing season extended to an almost all year round basis, the licensing activities of the Commission have increased substantially. In 1954, when licensing was initiated, the number of applications were 11,417. In 1968, the applications received and processed numbered 20,021, an increase of 8,604 or 75.36% over 1954. Of the 20,021 applications received, 4,232 were new applicants and 15,789 were renewals.

In 1968, the Commission approved 19,743 licenses of which 9,771 were horsemen and 9,972 were in other categories.

Section 100.1 of the Harness Racing Commission rules specifies that the winning horse in every race, and the second place horse in every Exacta race shall be subjected to a saliva test and a urine test for the purpose of determining any drug, stimulant, sedative, depressant, or other medicine. Further,

the track steward or presiding judge at any race meeting may order such tests for any other horse in the race. In races where the race purse exceeds \$7,500, the second and third horses therein shall be subjected to these tests.

In 1968, 23,413 samples were collected for chemical analysis by the State Racing Commission Laboratory. In two cases these tests indicated the presence of drugs and after thorough investigation of each case appropriate action was taken.

In addition to the protective measures described above commission personnel, assigned to the various tracks and working closely with track security police, are constantly on the alert for such undesirables as loiterers, touts, bookmakers, pickpockets, confidence men and other swindlers who, by their misconduct or mere presence at the track, would bring discredit to a fine sport.

REVIEW OF THE COMMISSION FUNCTION

The New York State Harness Racing Commission has a general jurisdiction over all pari-mutuel activities in the State and the corporations, associations and persons engaged therein.

Such general jurisdiction includes:

FIRST - protection and security to assure the public honest, competitive harness racing.

SECOND - to remove undesirable persons, undesirable or interlocking stock interests and ownership, and any other interests which may be detrimental to the sport and to pari-mutuel harness racing.

THIRD - to supervise labor and management relations so that racketeering elements shall not be able to creep into the sport or into the administrative portions of the business, but, at the same time, to preserve the rights of employees to bargain collectively.

FOURTH - to license all persons who participate in harness racing regardless of their position or occupation and to assure a secure method for keeping undesirable elements and unfit and improper persons from participating in pari-mutuel harness racing.

FIFTH - to supervise all building programs and to audit the books and records of licensed harness racing associations, corporations, and concessionaires engaged in the business.

SIXTH - to promulgate and file rules and regulations to properly supervise the sport.

In the administration of its responsibility the Commission, by its programs, has endeavored to instill public confidence in the integrity of the sport. This has been mostly achieved by:

- 1. The elimination of undesirable elements through the Commission's licensing program.
- The supervision of the security and protective measures utilized by harness racing associations.
- The examination of saliva and urine samples obtained from horses racing to establish whether such animals have been drugged or have been given some preparation which would affect their normal racing condition.
- 4. Conducting investigations on all matters pertaining to harness racing.
- 5. The ejection of bookmakers and touts.

- The assessment of penalties for racing violations of the rules and regulations of the Commission.
- 7. Conducting hearings of violations.
- 8. The training and appointment of competent racing officials.

One important responsibility of the Commission is the preparation, recodification and revision of the rules and regulations governing harness racing in this State.

Fully cognizant of the national scope of harness racing, the New York State Harness Racing Commission has established a close, friendly cooperation with the United States Trotting Association, wherein the exchange of ideas, records and material has noticeably enhanced the progress of the sport.

As part of this policy, Commission representatives attend the annual United States Trotting Association convention on rules and other related matters in Columbus, Ohio, in addition to having representation at the USTA District No. 8 meeting, which encompasses New York members.

In July of 1966, the Commission became affiliated with the National Association of State Racing Commissioners which gives us a top level liaison with the administrative racing function throughout the country.

The Commission annually conducts public hearings and conferences with racing officials, breeders, representatives of management, harness writers covering the sport, and other interested parties for the purpose of reviewing and evaluating the effectiveness of the rules and regulations.

At these conferences, the rules are exhaustively studied, committees are established to go into specific categories in depth and then submit reports to the Commission for final study, decision and action.

The Commissioners then meet in Executive session, at which they review the final recommendations of some of the most knowledgeable men in the sport, and make the decisions which will govern New York harness racing for the next season.



Yonkers Raceway's 1968 season was a highly successful one as witnessed by the average figures for attendance and handle, which soared over the previous year's mark, and the outstanding stakes and special events presented.

Over 135 nights of operation a grand total of 2,791,592 patrons went through the Westchester track's gates....an average of 20,678 daily, while \$276,867,350 was wagered for an average of \$2,050,869. The latter figure is the track's third highest during its 19-year history.

A spectacular \$2,240,400 was distributed in 48 stakes and features which included both Triple Crown events that carried \$150,000 purses....the Yonkers Futurity Trot and Cane Futurity Pace. Also, the Empire Pace and Hilltop Trot, each carrying a \$100,000 prize, the \$150,000 International Pacing Series and a world record of \$619,200 disbursed in ten New York Sires Stakes matches, enhanced the campaign.

In addition to great races, the heroics of Lucien Fontaine unseated perennial leader Del Insko from the driver's crown as the Canadian-born reinsman racked up 123 firsts. In addition, Fontaine added the money championship as his mounts banked \$502,368.

Perhaps the "greatest single day in harness racing" took place at Yonkers on October 12, when a visit by New Zealand's Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. Keith J. Holyoake, the retirement ceremonies and a children's party for Cardigan Bay and the contesting of \$150,000 Cane Futurity focused worldwide

And, in conjunction with the Lawrence B. Sheppard Pace, Yonkers added justly to the memory of the late great luminary of harness racing as it inaugurated a scholarship fund for veterinary students at the University of Pennsylvania, in his honor during a luncheon in Manhattan.

On the racing scene, two world records were set here in 1968. Flamboyant's 2:00 2/5, with John Chapman driving, established a 4-year-old mare trot mark on a half-mile course, while Meadow Elva's 1:59 2/5 with Del Insko aboard, did likewise for pacing mares.

Roosevelt

WESTBURY, N.Y., Dec. 7--The lights went out for 1968 at Roosevelt Raceway and the curtain lowered on the New York State racing season. 1968 was one of the most memorable campaigns in harness racing history.

Much has happened since the 1968 season opened in 33-degree temperature at Roosevelt on January 3. Billy Haughton, the master reinsman from Oyster Bay Cove, New York, has completed the finest season in his 23-year career. He banked more than \$439,000 at Roosevelt alone for his interests and and collected a record season's total of more than \$1,575,000. His stable earned an unprecedented \$2,500,000 for 1968.

Rum Customer captured the Cane, Little Brown Jug and Messenger Stakes to become the fourth horse in harness history to accomplish the feat. Only Adios Butler (1959), Bret Hanover (1965) and Romeo Hanover (1966) previously copped the Triple Crown.

Haughton dominated most of the major events at Roosevelt. He took the richest harness race of all-time -- the \$189,018.54 Messenger Stakes -- last October 26 with Rum Customer and completed the three-year-old pacing triple crown sweep in the process. Haughton's Stable came away with a record one-race haul of \$141,763 as Tropic Song finished second.

Haughton also accounted for the \$50,000 American Trotting Championship on June 22 with Carlisle; the \$15,000 silver division of the Challenge Cups with Flamboyant; the \$83,365.37 Roosevelt Futurity with the gifted two-year-old pacer, Laverne Hanover (a 22-time winner in 23 starts this season), the \$40,254.63 Lady Maud Pace with Thorpe Marge and the \$99,561.47 Realization Trot with Flamboyant last June 13.

While Haughton was having his banner year, two other drivers, Lucien Fontaine and John Chapman, reached milestones. Fontaine, only 29, became

the youngest driver in harness racing history to bank \$1,000,000 for his employers. He gained this plateau on November 26 with a flourish, taking three races in a row and going over the top with Chip Pick.

Chapman, who was 40 on October 25, posted his 2,000 lifetime victory on October 29 with the filly pacer, Green River Ally. He thus joined in the charmed circle: Haughton, Stanley Dancer, Joe O'Brien, Del Insko, Bob Farrington, Harry Burright, Levi Harner and Keith Waples.

Fontaine had his finest year at Roosevelt, taking the summer driving championship with ease from Chapman and virtually clinching the fall meet's title with a strong showing. "Loosh" has reined more than 250 victories this season for the first time in his career and will finish second nationally to the new record holder, Herve Filion, who was in the 350-triumph neighborhood at last accounts.

As for the gate and wagering averages, Roosevelt reached its high point in the summer when an average 22,275 wagered \$1,931,279 for the 48-night stand. Four nights were lost during this session, three because of a horsemen's strike and one out of respect for the memory of the assassinated Senator Robert F. Kennedy (Dem. - N.Y.)

The major race of the year was the 10th Roosevelt International Trot on July 13. That mile and a quarter event went to Roquepine, the French mare, who scored her second straight success in the International. She likely will return for a third crack at the world trotting championship.

Monticello

Monticello Raceway embarked on its second decade in 1968. The first ten years saw the Catskills track grow by leaps and bounds, and were jam-packed with exciting and nostalgic experiences. But if 1968 can be used as a measure, the next ten are to be sensational.

With Leon Greenberg at the helm as the President and General Manager, The Mighty M realized its finest tenure. Records were established that may forever grace the track's historical ledgers and on the track itself, racing was super.

When it was all said and done, statistics revealed the highest average handle ever, the highest per capita ever, the highest single night handle, the highest afternoon handle, the highest double-header handle, plus many other wagering and attendance marks. Over 1967, average handle was up 11.06%, average attendance 4.46% and average per capita 6.40%.

Too, the total handle was the second highest in the track's history. This came as the result of 109 programs, the record coming when 134 were utilized. Business was great and management responded by raising purses no less than four times during the season.

Over a half million dollars, \$502,787.40 to be exact, was disbursed for 36 stakes and special events. Both were records with the first stakes coming on opening night, May 16, and the final one September 13, the night before the Mighty M locked its doors on 1968.

Following the closing in September, Greenberg gave orders for the construction of a new, two-story, motel-style grooms' quarters, enclosure of the grandstand with retractable windows, renovation of the Ichabod Crane Terrace, main cafeteria and a general all around face-lifting.

UNCASHED WINNING

Goshen

Opening day at Historic Track's 130th year of harness racing was a scorcher. The mercury touched 100 degrees, it was humid. But the crowd was large and the racing excellent. Laverne Hanover, the sensational two-year-old pacer, ran his unbeaten streak to seven as the Tar Heel colt won the \$18,559 Goshen Cup in 2:02.4, coming back to wrap it up in 2:03. This followed Hammerin Hank's victory in the first elimination heat. Other events found Diller's Fleur in the winner's circle after a split heat Acorn Stakes while Stanley Dancer swept a pair of New York Sire Stakes, kicking off that rich series of races.

On July 2, afternoon number two of Grand Circuit week, three of the four races went off in elimination heats with 61 horses being programmed. The Debutante Stake for two-year-old pacing fillies had 23 starters, Scotch Jewel coming up the victor for Ralph Baldwin and Castleton Farm, while Adiola Hanover and Friendly Folly also posted heat wins. Nevele Major took the E. H. Harriman Challenge Trophy, making it two in a row for Nevele Acres. Nevele Pride won it last year in a stake mark of 2:04.4. Stanley Dancer was in the sulky both times. In the Harriman, Howard Beissenger won the second elimination heat after Nevele Major's triumph. In the final Dancer took his Star's Pride colt to the top at the half, staying there to win in 2:06.1, a season mark. The New York Sires Stakes for two-year-old colts and geldings of both gaits wrapped up the long afternoon. Bill Haughton won the trot with That's Great. Billy Myer claimed the pace with Rocky Creed.

Nevele Pride continued winning races on Historic's third afternoon, winding up with the silver in the \$10,000 Historic Dickerson Cup. He had only two rivals, Snow Speed and Keystone Spartan. Castleton's Snow Speed was right behind the winner both times and Keystone Spartan several lengths behind. Daring Speed, Slint Hodgins up, went to straight heat victories for the Coaching Club Trotting Oaks, a three-year-old event. Stanley Dancer then came on to claim two more Sire Stake trophies, first with Dolly Barmin and the other with Neon Rodney. Once again large fields for the seasonal debut of the Stakes made elimination heats necessary.

On July 4th, a very large holiday crowd patiently waited two and a half hours past the 1:30 post time while scores of trucks rounded the track trying to make it fit for racing. With the exception of the Ladyship Stake, all events went one dash only. The Titan Cup provided thrills for the hometown fans, Harry Pownall capturing it with Pomp, the Arden Homestead Stable entry. Pomp reached the quarter in 29.1, the half in 59.3, finally coming home in 2:01.2, a season record. The Armstrong Brothers, Sunnie Tar, was impressive while winning the Ladyship for Joe O'Brien, taking it in straight heats of 2:04.1 and 2:04.4. In the New York Sire Stakes, Yankee Time and Spoiler won the three-year-old pacing divisions. The two Mary McCune Amateur Trots went to Starflow and Stargill, driven by Arden Homestead's Peter Gerry and Elbridge T. Gerry, Jr.

On the final day, Fulla Napoleon and Bye and Large put on quite a show in the Orange County Cup. The result was a new track record, 1:58.3, supplied by Bye and Large, Bill Haughton driving for Kennilworth Farms. They came back to clock a 2:00.4 win. Fulla Napoleon and Dick Thomas placing each time. Stanley Dancer was at it again on wrap up day, taking the Sire Stake three-year-old trot with Fine Shot. Gene Pownall reined another winner in the Sire's four-year-old trotting event with Grig while Pat Iovine won with Sunny O'Brien, a four-year-old pace.

Saratoga

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. -- Any way you look at it, Saratoga had a great 1968 season.

New highs were set in attendance, handle and purse distribution. Three new world's records and a spate of national season's marks went on the books. Great champions lived up to expectations, and some cinderella horses wrote new rags-to-riches stories.

Saratoga president Ernest B. Morris and Mrs. Morris's Eric B, a home-bred trotter ran up a win string of 16 straight, including the Spring and July Championship Series, before meeting with defeat.

Nancy Lynne, owned by Frenchman's Cove Stable, included the Spa's July Championship Sire Stakes wins among her victories as she established herself as the top money-winning two-year-old filly in the nation.

The great Nevele Pride ripped off a new world's standard of 2:01 in the Grand Circuit opener, the Runnymede Division of the Battle of Saratoga. Then Billy Haughton took over Spa's "Roarin' Grand" action. Seven Grand Circuit events were programmed on a single night, and Haughton drove five winners, setting two world's records with Laverne Hanover.

Haughton also won the two-year-old filly trotting event with Brocade, and two nights later, took honors with the two-year-old trotting colt Nardins Gayblade. Other Grand Circuit winners were Queen Omaha, Keystone Starlet, Sunnie Tar and Rum Customer.

The August early closers proved as hot as the weather. Vernon Dancer's Night Watch scrambled over 23 original starters to win the Four-Star Trot. Jimbo Thomas, lame and unwanted in January, swept the Four-Star Pace series. Go Yates, another pacer out of the bargain basement won the Five-Star Pace. Aztec starred in the Five-Star Trotting legs, only to go down to defeat in the final as Amastar won.

Paul Battis, in June, repeated Ken Heeney's pioneer accomplishment of 1967 by driving four consecutive winners on one night.

Vernon Downs

VERNON -- More drivers drove more horses from more stables in more races over more nights at Vernon Downs this past season than in any other year in the track's history.

This was the crux of the Vernon racing department's annual statistical report, compiled by racing secretary Jerry M. Monahan.

In all, 335 licensed drivers competed in one or more races at the home of the miracle mile this year, according to Monahan's report. This compared with a total of 297 reinsmen who drove here in 1967.



Vernon again offered its series of Saturday morning children's programs in July and drew more than 2,000 youngsters and adults for each. The programs included tours of the paddock and stable areas, free refreshments and coloring books, and a slate of qualifying races.

A total of 1,809 trotters and pacers from 436 training stables had one or more starts over the miracle mile in 1968 to top the record figures of 1,380 horses and 269 stables turned in during 1967.

The 152 nights of racing offered this year was a new high for the track.

A total of 46 per cent of this year's races resulted in photo finishes, Monahan indicated. Forty-four per cent of the heats raced last year ended in a photo.

The percentage of winning favorites in 1968 was 36.5 per cent, only a half per cent down from the 1967 figure, the racing secretary's report showed.

Sixteen two-minute miles were recorded during the past season, equaling the miracle miles turned in during the 1967 campaign.

Weather was again a leading factor in the number of two-minute trips recorded, with 46 "off-tracks" during the meeting holding the total to 16. Last year there were 39 "off-tracks" during the 141-night campaign.

Batavia Downs

BATAVIA -- Batavia Downs opened its racing season on the earliest date in its long history in 1968....February 29. Three-quarters of a million fans and \$46 million later it closed on November 30 with a twin bill.

When the horses paraded to the post for the Batavia Downs Colt Stake for 2-year-old pacers on August 13, fans were expecting a great battle between the Billy Haughton entry of Berra Hanover and Ace Hill, and two Canadian entries, Penn Hanover and Super Wave. They got what they were expecting and a little more as Super Wave under the urging of Jack Kopas blazed home in 2:02. This shattered by 1 3/5 seconds the old track record for juveniles set by Deputy Hanover in 1965.

Then on the following evening Adam Eden equalled the track mark for 2-year-old trotters in another Batavia Downs Colt Stake by winning in 2:07 1/5 with Del Manges in the bike.

All in all 37 pacers and 8 trotters bettered 2:05 during the 154-night stand at Batavia. Fourteen other side wheelers got home under 2:03.

The New York Sire Stakes and the Batavia Downs Colt and Filly Stakes attracted entries from all of the United States and Canada and were well received by harness fans of the area.

Herman R. Grannis, general manager of the Downs, was elected to the presidency of Harness Tracks of America early in the year. William F. Brown, Jr. was re-elected National Secretary of the Harness Writers and Jerome Hauck was named to head HHI.

As the Downs begins preparing for the 1969 season which opens in late February they are well represented in all national areas of the sport.

Buffalo

Buffalo Raceway has concluded its 27th season of harness racing. The 83 night meeting proved one of the most successful in the popular Hamburg tracks history. A total of 416,913 fans wagered \$24,696,611 on the outcome of 809 pari-mutuel races.

The attendance was the 6th highest ever while the total handle ranked 2nd only to 1964's all time high when \$26,692,872 was wagered during the 87 night meeting. The 1968 meeting ranked 3rd in nightly average handle. The \$290,349 average trailed only 1964 and 1965.

Per capita wagering, \$59.23, was an all-time record.

Originally granted 84 nights, Buffalo Raceway actually operated 83 nights -having cancelled the Friday, June 7 program, out of respect to the memory of the assassinated Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

On the racetrack, three new records were established. The incomparable Nevele Pride turned in a 2:02 3/5 clocking--a new trotting mark for 3-year-old colts. The time also equalled the fastest trotting mile ever recorded at Buffalo Raceway by a horse of any age. Terrence Hanover, the original record setter, set his mark in 1959.

Nevele Major's 2:06 4/5 is a new record for 2-year-old trotting colts. The latter is a half brother to Nevele Pride. Penn Hanover turned in a sensational 2:02 4/5 pacing mile this season at Buffalo Raceway, thereby establishing a brand new mark for 2-year-old sidewheelers. All three record shattering performances occurred during the July 6-19 Grand Circuit" meeting with in a meeting."

Del Manges with 50 victories almost doubled the number of dash wins of any other driver. The top Universal rated driver at the Hamburg, N. Y. track was Johnny Schroeder. Schroeder's average was an excellent .395 based on 28 wins, 21 seconds and 16 thirds.
